Amelia Earhart Memorial Scholarships for Women Pilots

Featured: Mid Atlantic 99s Section Scholarship

Application Deadline: September 1, 2019

Scholarship Amount: Up to \$5,000

Brief Description: To support women pilots in the continued pursuit of aeronautical skills, both professionally and recreationally. Any Ninety-Nines member seeking to increase proficiency or regain currency by adding a new rating or certificate by participating in a defined training activity, e.g. instrument training, seaplane, tailwheel, mountain flying, aerobatics.

Scholarship Requirements: Application consisting of the following:

- An essay strictly limited to <u>one</u> typewritten page describing the applicant's objectives in obtaining the scholarship (i.e. professional aviation career; increasing proficiency; regaining currency), and how the scholarship will be used to advance that goal.
- Essays should emphasize what this training would mean to the applicant, and how the applicant would "pay it forward" to other Ninety-Nines by returning value to the aviation community.
- Any supporting documentation you deem important, such as:
 - Evidence of passing written or practical test, if applicable.
 - Current flight medical/BFR or other pertinent training
 - Documented TOTAL cost of flight training requested <u>and</u> how you will pay for the additional cost of training not covered by the scholarship (make it clear that there are sufficient funds from other sources to complete the training or course of study). Financial need is not a requirement, but is an evaluation factor (tie-breaker).
- Letter of recommendation from applicant's chapter chair verifying member's activity & participation in Chapter.

Scholarship Limitations:

- Applicant must be a current member (in good standing) of the Mid Atlantic Section of The Ninety-Nines.
- Training must be completed at the discretion of the committee.
- Scholarship is **NOT** available to student pilots for initial flight training towards their private pilot certificate.
- The Mid Atlantic Section of The Ninety-Nines Scholarship Committee may request additional information.

Scholarship funds will be disbursed to the appropriate training FBO or training organization. Invoices shall be submitted to the Treasurer of the Mid Atlantic Scholarship of The Ninety-Nines.

Scholarship will be awarded based on qualified applicant and Award will be announced at the Fall Section Meeting.

Monthly Feature – FAA Runway Safety

Runway Safety continues to be one of the FAA's highest priorities – encompassing Pilots, Air Traffic Controllers, and Airport Vehicle Drivers. The FAA Website offers guidance, resources and expertise on this important topic.

Runway Incursions

- → What is a Runway Incursion?
 - Any occurrence at an aerodrome involving the incorrect presence of an aircraft, vehicle or person on the protected area of a surface designated for the landing and take off of aircraft.
 - Runway Incursions are classified by type, typically falling into one of three categories: Operational Incidents (OIs), Pilot Deviations (PDs), or Vehicle/Pedestrian Deviations (V/PDs).

There are four categories of runway incursions:


- → Category A is a serious incident in which a collision was narrowly avoided.
- → Category B is an incident in which separation decreases and there is a significant potential for collision, which may result in a time critical corrective/evasive response to avoid a collision.
- → Category C is an incident characterized by ample time and/or distance to avoid a collision.
- Category D is an incident that meets the definition of runway incursion such as incorrect presence of a single vehicle/person/aircraft on the protected area of a surface designated for the landing and take-off of aircraft but with no immediate safety consequences.

Over 80% of pilot-caused runway incursions occur during taxi to the Departure Runway.

- → What is a Surface Incident?
 - A surface incident is an unauthorized or unapproved movement within the designated movement area (excluding runway incursions) or an occurrence in that same area associated with the operation of an aircraft that affects or could affect the safety of flight.

Airport Diagrams

Airport Diagrams are specifically designed to assist in the movement of ground traffic at locations with complex runway/taxiway configurations.



Types of Surface Events



Operational Incident

A surface event attributed to ATC action or inaction.



Pilot Deviation

Action of a pilot that violates any federal aviation regulation. Example: A pilot crosses a runway without a clearance while en route to an airport gate.




Vehicle/Pedestrian Deviations

Any entry or movement on the movement area or safety area by a vehicle (including aircraft operated by a non-pilot or an aircraft being towed) or pedestrian that has not been authorized by ATC.

Hot Spots

A hot spot is defined as a location on an airport movement area with a history of potential risk of collision or runway incursion, and where **heightened attention by pilots and drivers** is necessary.

I contacted International about our missing delegate slips on the Saturday before the convention, and the issue was easily resolved in plenty of time for the meeting. We had 7 votes. The revision to the by laws passed with little discussion. But one change did generate a lot of comments. This change says that only one vendor will be used for voting, and they will do both electronic and paper ballots (i.e. cannot use separate vendors for different ballots). I have written to headquarters for clarification, asking especially if we can do both in house like we did this year. I will let you know what the answer is, and it will impact our by law revisions. (Sophia, please let me know what "app" you used for the electronic voting).

The title sounded really dry, but it ended up being very interesting and worthwhile. So, after the seminar and a brief look at our existing By Laws, the conclusion is YES we must revise ours by laws ASAP!! Although, according to the existing by laws, we cannot vote on them until next spring with the election ballots. I suggest we form a By Laws committee that can get to work and make suggested revisions. One big change is that we cannot require chapter dues - they are strictly optional!!!

Let's schedule the first meeting of the By Laws Committee for Saturday, September 7th, here in my office at MTN, at 10am. Anyone interested in serving on the committee, please give me a call and I will add you to the list. Thanks.
