


Our Chapter will meet again in August, likely at 0W3—we will be very busy getting ready for airmarking and hosting the fall section meeting.

I'm working on my private pilot certificate full-time and am hoping to earn a pilot slot in the U.S. Air Force Reserve. Eventually I would love to be a Delta Air Lines pilot and continue traveling the globe with a pair of wings for the best airline in the world. I am also honored to be a 2nd Lt in the Civil Air Patrol Andrews Composite Squadron and am looking forward to my onboarding experience as a Civil Air Patrol pilot. "Here's a little bit about myself: I've been flying with my dad in a Cessna 172 since I was about 4 years old. I've basically grown up in that plane and have so many amazing memories from it. I started taking lessons at Brett Aviation when I was still in high school, but I was only 15, so I couldn't drive yet. Scheduling became hard, and I had to wait until I was older before I could really get serious about my training. Now at 19, I've been able to keep track of my own schedule. I've been taking lessons down at Martin State with Kara Murano since the beginning of May. It's been so great!! I've definitely fallen in love with flying, even more than before. It is an honor for me to be able to fly the Cessna 172 that I've grown up in. I try to practice with Kara three times a week. Sometimes my dad and I will go up for pattern work as well. I went up to practice the pattern with my dad on Sunday and I have another lesson with Kara tomorrow morning.

School-wise, I'm a sophomore at Penn State University. I'm majoring in Public Relations, and double-minoring in Media Production and Business. I hope to also achieve a Sports Journalism certificate but the time I graduate. This summer, besides working on my private pilot's license, I'm working two jobs. The first as a lifeguard, and the other as a research assistant at PSU."

Alice Li came to the US from China. In China, she always knew she wanted to fly since she was 10 or 11. The standards in China were very high—first physical ones, males only, height requirements and no glasses were permitted. You also had to be in the military to be trained, as there is no general aviation as there is in the US. Aviation is highly regulated, and she did not qualify. When she came to the US, she started at flight school, saved up and started training to be a pilot. She started when she was 16—it took 2 yrs for her to get her license. Unfortunately, she has not flown for 2 yrs—but wants to try to go back and get her instrument rating. Alice's drive and persistence are tremendous and we hope that she soon gets back in the air!

Dear Alice (Our Treasurer),

In 2009, as Chairman of the MD 99s at that time, I was contacted by FOX Studios in Hollywood. At first I thought it was a joke, but it was real. They were getting ready to release the film about Amelia Earhart called AMELIA starring Hilary Swank playing Amelia Earhart and her leading man was Richard Gere. Special Feature submitted by Donna Suwall (as a landmark date, June 15, 1921, passed 100 years since Bessie Coleman received her pilot's license)



This is why Bessie Coleman went to France to learn to fly

From the Institute for Women Of Aviation Worldwide (iWOAW) – a not-for-profit organization headquartered in Montreal, Canada

IWOAW is celebrating 100 Years of Female Pilots of all Races as part of Women Of Aviation Week 2021.

"You n--- women ain't never goin' to fly, not like those women I saw in France," her brother John told her in front of her clientele at the barbershop where she specialized in manicure care. She smiled and replied; "That's it – You just called it for me."

She applied to almost every American flying school to no avail. Coleman's flying dreams were put on hold until she met Robert S. Abbott, editor and publisher of the Chicago Weekly Defender.

He suggested France as a training spot for her because, as he put it, the French still possessed a kind of "aero mania" and were more liberal in their attitudes toward women and "people of color."

Aviation was born in France. The world's first human flight took place in Paris, France in 1783 when Étienne Montgolfier lifted off onboard the Montgolfier Brothers' balloon. Unlike the Wright Brothers who refused to train or sell airplanes to women in the June 2021

early 1900s, the Montgolfier Brothers in the late 1700s were eager to share flying with whomever was willing to try. Less than a year after the 1783 first flight, Marie Élisabeth Thible of Lyon, France, became the first woman to fly. In 1798, Jeanne Labrosse of Paris, France, became the first woman to pilot an aircraft solo. In 1799, she made the world's first female parachute jump.

By the 1920s, French men had indeed acquired quite a reputation for training women and anyone else who wanted to learn to fly. Nine of the first ten women in the world to earn a pilot licence did so with a French man as an instructor. Hélène Dutrieu (#4) of Belgium travelled to France to learn to fly. So did Hilda Hewlett (#10) of England and many other women across Europe.

Those who could not travel to France often learned from French expatriates. Harriet Quimby (#10), the first American woman to earn a pilot licence in 1911, studied at the Moisant flight school owned by the French-Canadian-American Moisant Brothers. Amalia Celia Figueredo of Argentina trained with Frenchman Paul Castaibert.

At that time, learning a new language just to be able to fly was easier than fighting off blatant discrimination. That is why Bessie Coleman learned French at a language school on Chicago's Loop while working to save money for flight training.

One of France's most famous flight schools, l'école d'aviation des frères Caudron au Crotoy managed by French pilots and plane designers Gaston and René Caudron, accepted her training application. On November 20, 1920, she set sail towards France.

For the next seven months, she walked each day to the flight school and learned to master tailspins, banking and looping the loop. On June 15, 1921, she received international pilot's license No. 18.310 and became the world's first non-Caucasian woman to hold a pilot licence.
